Issued by the Oil Region Alliance of Business, Industry & Tourism (ORA) on August 26, 2025.

The ORA is accepting quotations for the design, layout, and fabrication of 11 replacement outdoor interpretive panels. ORA will provide the selected firm with all graphics and text to be used on each panel in digital formats. The panels will follow the typical format of other ORA panels found through the Oil Region National Heritage Area. Procurement of panel frames and installation are not part of this project.

Quotations must be received in the ORA office no later than 4:00 p.m. on Friday, September 19, 2025, and be valid for at least 120 days. Include all information requested; additional information may be submitted, if necessary. Award decision will be made on September 25, 2025; IFQ respondents will be notified thereafter.

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OIL REGION ALLIANCE INTERPRETIVE PANEL EXAMPLES

Joseph Sibley's River Ridge



River Ridge was known as Argeon Farm in the late 1800s when it was owned by Franklin attorney and bank president Robert G. Lamberton. It was a "handsome and productive farm" with a magnificent five-story brick barn, which still exists. The barn had entries leading to three levels and could house hundreds of cows and horses, and feed for a full year.

In 1911, Argeon Farm was purchased and renamed River Ridge by Joseph Sibley, who had amassed a vast fortune from oil and the Galena-Signal Oil Company. Mr. Sibley was elected mayor of Franklin, served four terms in the United States Congress, and

was considered for a presidential or vice-presidential nomination in 1898. He retired from politics in 1906.

Mr. Sibley expanded the farm to over 1,000 acres, extending three miles along the Allegheny River. He began large scale experimental farming and built 21 other structures, some of which can be seen from this location. A 33-room mansion was completed in 1913, using hundreds of workmen and stone quarried on the farm. Mr. Sibley was a generous host. He enjoyed inviting county farmers to come to River Ridge to learn the latest techniques in agriculture.



The hillside to the mansion was surrounded by a flowering hedge like



The mansion "went up by magic," according to the second Mrs. Sibley. Ida and Joseph Sibley were married in the living room on December 6, 1913, six months after construction began.



The 12,000-pound chimes in the Campanile sounded throughout the valley three times a day for 47 years
